Nothing is more fundamental to the U.S. Constitution and our democracy than the right of every citizen to vote. While approximately 66% of those eligible turned out to vote in 2020*, the one-third (approximately 77 million) who did not vote represent the highest proportion of non-voters in a presidential election in one hundred years.** How do we change this dynamic and convince citizens that their vote and their voice matters and is a tool for change?

Black Voters Matter: Assistance for local organizations seeking non-profit status




Legal Skills Wanted! Black Voters Matter (BVM), JusticeAid's 2024 grantee-partner, is recruiting volunteer attorneys who can walk BVM's community partners through incorporating and then filing their 501(c)(3) applications. There are currently over 20 groups needing immediate support, but the list grows each week. These groups are located mainly in the southeast region and are at various stages of the incorporation process. Some groups may need state level assistance (e.g. registering with the secretary of state) in addition to filling out the federal paperwork. These are grassroots organizations that provide all types of critical services to their communities, including affordable housing, food drives, elderly care, therapy, and more.

ClassACT Lawyers will meet via ZOOM for a one-hour training session with BVM and then be paired with a local organization. The time commitment is an estimated 1-10 hours to be worked out between the ClassACT volunteer lawyer and the organization itself. Lawyers can perform this work on a remote basis. ClassACT will organize a webinar to teach volunteers what they need to know about filing a 501(c)(3) application with the IRS. **Be on the lookout for more information!**

Voter Intimidation Could Be a Threat in Arizona

Arizona has emerged once again as a key battleground state in the 2024 Presidential election. Outcomes in the Grand Canyon State are likely to be even more unpredictable this election cycle because of changing demographics and a surge in voter suppression tactics like intimidation at the polls.

Until the last presidential election, Arizona had been considered solidly Republican. But the Latino share of the population increased by 16 percent from 2010 to 2020, and Latinos tend to vote Democratic. The result is a state that pundits now label "purplish."

Along with the uncertainty of the presidential race in Arizona is the question of whom voters will choose for a US Senate seat this November. Incumbent

Sen. Kyrsten Sinema, formerly a Democrat, opted to become an independent in December 2022. If she runs for reelection, her Democratic opponent is likely to be Phoenix Rep. Ruben Gallego '04, a U.S. Marine who served in Iraq. Kari Lake, an election denier who lost her gubernatorial campaign in 2022, is the front-runner on the Republican side. The Cook Report calls the race a toss-up at this point.

Adding to the volatility of Arizona politics are fears that some of the voter suppression and intimidation tactics of the last two election cycles may resurface. The courts have prohibited right-wing extremist intimidation tactics like harassing voters at ballot drop boxes. However, many election officials who worked to maintain fair elections in 2020 and 2022 have resigned because of such tactics.

State's Abortion Laws Key to Arizona's Election

According to <u>Oregon Public Broadcasting</u>, Arizona could be center stage in the battle over reproductive rights. Republicans passed a law in 2021 banning elective abortions after 15 weeks of pregnancy, and the state imposes additional requirements upon pregnant women that create barriers to obtaining a timely abortion. In fact, the Arizona Supreme Court is considering the status of <u>an 1864 law, still on the books</u>, that could, if reactivated, result in a near total ban.

Regardless of the court's decision, efforts are underway to amend the state constitution through a ballot initiative, likely to occur in the November 2024 election. That amendment would establish the right to abortion up until fetal viability (typically 24 weeks). American Civil Liberties Union and Planned Parenthood of Arizona are among the groups sponsoring the effort to collect the signatures required to get the proposal on the ballot. As of December 2023, there were 384,000 signatories out of the 400,000 needed by July 2024, and sponsors hope to reach 600,000 by July. Conservative groups, including the Heritage Foundation, Catholic Church organizations and others are countering the effort with a planned March for Life rally in

Phoenix. There is also an ad campaign and outreach to students on college campuses, backed by Students for Life of America in Arizona and 5 other states, which is designed to appeal to young conservative voters.

Multiple candidates have filed to run for Arizona's nine Congressional seats, but which ones will remain on the ballot for the general election will depend on results of the state's August 6 primary. Of those who filled out a Ballotopedia survey on their political priorities, three Democrats —Cody Newman, Kirsten Engel, and Bernadette Placentia—listed abortion rights as one of their key issues.

New voters in Arizona must register by February 20 in order to vote in the presidential primary election.

The Crenshaw High School STEM Magnet Sports Analytics Club members in Los Angeles, CA, designed and formulated a <u>research project</u> to present Marques Johnson to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. The five-time NBA All-Star and former NCAA champion is one step away after being a Finalist in 2019 and 2021.

In the portfolio submitted to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, numerous career statistics of Marques Johnson were analyzed and compared to six other existing Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame members. This project gave the students real-world experience in developing math, reading, collaborative research, and critical thinking skills.

Call to Action: Reproductive Issues And the 2024 Election

In the aftermath of the demise of Roe v Wade, access to abortion has energized voters of both parties through ballot initiatives, state and local elections, policies initiatives and judicial appointments. Although most ClassACT HR73 members are well beyond reproductive age, the issue has had a profound impact on all of us including healthcare providers, patients and communities - regardless of party affiliation or religious persuasion.

Physicians and others who practice obstetrics and gynecology are often torn between their duty to uphold the Hippocratic oath and their attempts to navigate a complicated and confusing set of rules and regulations written in language that is at odds with medical definitions. A recent survey of OB-GYNs in states with the most restrictive laws found that 42% were concerned about legal risk in making medical decisions and 40% felt constrained in their ability to manage any pregnancy-related emergency. Faced with potential imprisonment, many are looking to relocate to parts of the country with fewer restrictions, causing or exacerbating physician shortages. Nationally, the majority of OB-GYNs believe that the Dobbs decision has worsened maternal mortality rates; 70% believe it has increased disparities based on race. For patients, it can mean traveling great distances for care, and this is not limited to abortion access if a community loses its OB-GYN. Communities without adequate women's health care have higher mortality rates (especially maternal), which has implications for the ability to attract a younger workforce (including healthcare providers) and the overall quality of life.

Recognizing and respecting that abortion is a deeply personal and moral issue, we seek to create opportunities for meaningful conversations that are informed by facts with our elected representatives, community members and other voters. The ClassACT HR73 subgroup on reproductive issues plans to create a resource guide for those seeking to learn more or to volunteer with non-partisan organizations dedicated to reproductive issues including abortion access. This month's newsletter article on Arizona (see above) illustrates how access to abortion has become an important issue for voters. We have a starting list of relevant non-profit, non-partisan organizations. We are eager to engage more classmates in making these resources robust and useful.




And The Survey Says....
